NOTES ON OUR OTHER COUNTY HISTORY PUBLICATIONS

The Newton County Homestead, Volume II, Number 2, September, 1960, consists of 68 pages. It has several illustrations, three being of the Diamond Cave. Some of the noteworthy features are: Marriage Records of Newton County, 1866 through 1871; Muster Roll of the First Regiment Arkansas Infantry Volunteers, Union, Company C; Muster Roll and Historic Memoranda of the Second Regiment Arkansas Cavalry Volunteers, Union, Company L. Walter Lackey of Low Gap is editor.

The Independence County Chronicle, Volume I, Number 4, July, 1960, is a printed bulletin of 53 pages. All other county bulletins are mimeographed. Among interesting features are these: The Neill Tannery; Hartwell Boswell; Pioneer Physicians of Batesville; Postal History of Independence County. The editor is A. C. McGinnis.

The Faulkner County Facts and Fiddlings, Volume II, Number 3, August 1960, is an attractive bulletin of 22 pages. Some of the features are: Diary of George Stermer; Conway Baptist Church; On Medicine in Arkansas; Named Places in Faulkner County. Guy W. Murphy is editor.

The Carroll County Historical Quarterly, Volume V, Number 3, September 1960, is a bulletin of 28 pages. It carries stories of several family reunions; excerpts from the census records relating to several townships in Carroll County; and a story of Slavery in Arkansas. Coy Logan is editor.

The Benton County Pioneer, Volume V, Number 6, is a bulletin of 33 pages. The date is September, 1960. Some features are: The Bentonville Bank Robbery of 1893; Aunt Mary Doak; Address of Conrad L. Wirth; One hundred years of Grahams in Benton County. The name of the editor is not indicated.
