Abner McGehee died April 9 at his home, 1315 Scott Street, at the age of 57 years. He was one of the wealthy business men of Arkansas.

Albert Belding, age 30 years, died April 12, at the Capitol Theater. He lived here all of his life and was as well known as many of the older citizens.

Harry Cannon Bateman died May 23 at his home, 400 Chester Street, at the age of 54. He lived in Little Rock for 32 years and was a prominent railroad commercial agent.

Mrs. Priscilla A. B. Reardon, aged 87 years, died at her home, 1400 Spring Street, on May 13, after having lived in this city for 68 years. She was one of the first settlers here.

Mrs. Mary Gleason, aged 67 years, died May 10 at her home in the Gleason Hotel. She had lived here for 38 years and was well known, especially for work in the cause of charity.

Joshua Harp died April 28 at the age of 71 years, at 1214 West Markham Street. He was a resident of Little Rock for 64 years, one of the first settlers.

J. T. W. Tillar died June 5, at 621 West Third Street, at the age of 75 years. He was a capitalist and said to be the wealthiest man in Arkansas at the time of his death.

W. H. Feild, aged 81 years, died June 1, at 811 Scott Street. He was a planter and had lived in Little Rock for 50 years.

William Fulton Wright died at the age of 62 years at his home in Pulaski Heights June 4. He was a prominent real estate dealer and had been a resident of the city for 35 years.

Peter Cavanaugh died June 1 at his home, 1623 West Seventh Street. He was 83 years old at the time of his death and had spent 58 years of his life in Little Rock.

Carl William Nothwong died July 24 at his home, 211 Sherman Street, at the age of 46 years. He had lived in Little Rock since he was 7 years old, and for years owned a grocery store at 607 East Second Street.

Thomas J. Mitchell died July 13 at his home, 1872 State Street. He was 43 years old and had lived here for 39 years, a well-known contractor.

Ike Rosen, one of the best-known merchants of Little Rock, died at the age of 36 years at his home, 1020 West Fourth Street, on July 11. He had lived here 20 years.

Dr. Claibourne Watkins died July 19, at the age of 64 years. He had lived here his entire life and was a prominent physician.

James Lawson Reid, one of the most prominent financiers, died September 3 at the age of 43 years, in California, where he had gone on account of his health.

H. H. Rattahen died September 17 at his home, 519 Rector Avenue, at the age of 69 years, as the result of a gunshot wound after having lived here for 40 years. He was sheriff at one time and very prominent in local political affairs for years. He was one of the first sheriffs after the reconstruction period and was chief of the Fire Department in the early days.

James Keith, financier and real estate dealer, died September 13, at the age of 89, at his home, 111½ West Fourth Street. He lived here for 45 years and was wealthy.

J.P. Steen, retired merchant, died September 8 at 1021 Center Street, at the age of 68 years, after having lived here for 25 years.
