7. Heirs to the Philbrook Property in Arkansas and New Hampshire (n.p.; n.d.) This is a listing of genealogical data on the heirs of Eliphalet and Sarah Philbrook residing principally in New England, New York, and Illinois.

8. Apparently the reference is to Henry C. Byrd, portrait painter of Little Rock and Batesville during the 1840's. The picture referred to was possibly that of Governor William Fulton. Ellison seems to mean that Byrd was finishing or retouching a portrait of Fulton done by a previous artist. Arkansas State Gazette, June 14, 1843, mentioned a likeness of the "elder Fulton" then at the Byrd studio.

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Hugh Park, of Van Buren, Arkansas, has recently reprinted Cephias Washburn's REMINISCENCES OF THE INDIANS. This rare old book was first published in 1869, and has been out of print and almost impossible to obtain for many years. The reprint edition includes a facsimile frontispiece and a biography of the Washburn family by editor Park. Little Rock readers will particularly enjoy the account of the Arkansas Traveler painting by Edward P. Washburn, son of the pioneer minister. The book sells for \$3.75.

Washington County Historical Society has issued two new bulletins. Bulletin No. 11 is THE WASHBURNS -- FATHER AND SON and contains an account of the marking of Cephias Washburn's grave in Mt. Holly cemetery, two accounts of the Arkansas Traveler painting, and scattered notes on the Washburn family. Bulletin No. 12 is SESSION MINUTES OF THE CUMBERLAND PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH OF CANE HILL, ARKANSAS, 1828-1843. It contains much valuable data on the pioneer families of Washington county.
