5. This is a good illustration of how internal affairs aided the defeat of the Confederacy. At this time the war had been in progress only a year.
6. General Beauregard had succeeded Albert Sidney Johnson after Johnson's death at Shiloh.
7. General Hindman, while in Little Rock, had his headquarters in the Roswell Beebe home. This home, a palatial mansion, stood on Markham street facing the Old State House. The grounds extended from Center to Spring Streets. There was a sunken garden in the rear. The house was burned in 1865. Beebe had died in 1856. (From an undated typed document by Emma Beebe Faust in the Mrs. E. V. Moore collection. At the end is the statement that "this is the history of the Beebe family in Arkansas to April 5, 1945.")
8. General Nelson died in the Fall of 1862. There now stands in Mount Holly Cemetery a small marker about 18 inches high by 10 inches wide and 2 inches thick. On it, now considerably worn by time, is the inscription, "General A. Nelson." Out from Cabot eastward a few miles is a Confederate cemetery now taken over by the forest, but around it is an iron fence and over the gateway is an arch with the inscription, "Camp Nelson Cemetery." This editor visited it a few years ago.
