SOME HISTORICAL NOTES ON THE LITTLE ROCK SCHOOLS

In the late 1930s, Mr. Charles F. Allen, then supervisor of secondary education in the Little Rock Public Schools, prepared an article entitled "70 Years of Secondary Education," which was published in the Gazette Magazine for February 12, 1939.

In it he drew from school records and files which he reports have now been burned. Much of his paper is devoted to the curriculum work then being carried on in Little Rock. But it also contains other matters of historical interest. Excerpts are given here:
