Death-1937 0206Feb 6-Death: Rosa McFarland, age 30 years, Negro, died this morning at 5 o'clock of injuries resulting from a fractured skull late yesterday afternoon when a automobile in which she was a passenger was struck by a Missouri-Pacific passenger train at Lewis crossing located in the Western part of town on Buford Street. Other occupants of the car who were injured were Bill McFarland, husband of the deceased, and their son, 8 years old, J. W. McFarland. Bill McFarland was driver of the car, and received a lacerated hand and internal injuries; the son suffered a concussion of the brain, bad cuts on the hand, and probably internal injuries. The family lived on the Norsworthy plantation, located Northeast of the Cabin in the Cotton. It is reported that McFarland stalled on the railroad track when the train going north struck it. The impact knocked the car about 200 yard down the track. The injured received medical treatment.

Valadez, age 48, was a native of Mexico, and is survived by wife and children. Stevens FH has charge of burial tomorrow.

Death-1937 0212Feb 12-Death: Friends in this city are in receipt of news of the death of Mrs. Abe Meyer, in Poteau, Okla., on Feb. 6. Mrs. Meyer was a former resident of Forrest City. The late Mr. Abe Meyer came to Forrest City a number of years ago and engaged in mercantile business in a building on the site where the Armory, now stands. The opening of his store was significant in that he hired women as salesladies at that time. Mrs. Meyer had celebrated her ninety third birthday on Feb. 4, and was taken ill a short time afterward. Mrs. Meyer's brother, the late Julius Lesser, lived in Marianna, and was one of the largest merchants and cotton buyer in Lee county, and did much to develop the business growth of the county. She was the sister of Mrs. M. Isaacs of Shreveport, La., who also made her home here before. Burial is in Memphis. She had four sons surviving, Louis and John Altman of New York, and ?Ben and Theodore Meyer of Poteau, Okla.; one brother, Morris Lesser of Memphis.

flowing about one half foot over the road at that point near the L'Anguille river crosses that highway. S.
