

Death-19400206- Death-Thomas Oliver Fitzpatrick, pioneer resident of St. Francis Co. passed away at his home here last night, Feb.5,1940. Death closed the versatile career of 91 year old famous historian of Eastern Arkansas. His Memory and the annals of the early days which he preserved for posterity, live on. He would have been 92 in April, had been in ill health for some time. Although he was known as a historian, he had been engaged in a number of occupations, among them Circuit Clerk of Cross and St. Francis Counties, surveyor, editor of the Wittsburg Gazette, farmer and ginner, former Postmaster of Forrest City for many years. Known as "The Sage of Crowley Ridge," Mr. Fitzpatrick for years had been considered the greatest living authority on the early day history of the Ridge, and he played a major part in preserving pioneer records and events of this section. He is the author of a number of manuscripts, depicting some or the important events of pioneer life and his exactness mad him doubly valuable as an authority on history. Scores of persons trekked up the hillside to Mr. Fitzpatrick's home to obtain information about lost kin of long ago, or some personality or incident forgotten by others. Those who could not come, wrote him-many from different states-and he was

always generous with his store of knowledge. In fact, he seemed to feel a keen sense of duty in passing on his wealth of knowledge and helped those who sought information. In his youth, Mr. Fitzpatrick developed an interest in events and personalities of the Ridge region and he would listen for hours to the earliest settlers, thus gaining most of his information first hand. This he supplemented with wide research. The present generation is largely indebted to Mr. Fitzpatrick for the histories of Cross and St. Francis Counties, and nearly all these histories, as well as articles pertaining to them have been written from information which he gave. It is generally conceded that he made the greatest contribution of any person in preserving happenings of the pioneer days. His unusual memory made it possible for him to relate with minute correctiveness details of lost villages, landmarks, political battles, and legal proceedings. During his recent illness, he was so anxious to answer certain inquiries regarding this section which he had that he dictated the information from his bedside. Although he was a Republican and was active in the interests of that party, he was revered by both Democrats and Republicans who admired him for the stand which he made for his convictions. He served as a member of the Republican State Committee for more than 30 years. He was a delegate from this state to the Republican convention in 1904, and an alternate delegate to Chicago in 1932. He was Forrest City postmaster for many years, beginning in the 80's and again beginning in 1905 for about eight years. Mr. Fitzpatrick always maintained an interest in political and civic affairs. Mr. Fitzpatrick was born Apr.6,1849, in Lauderdale Co., Tenn., but moved to Arkansas when he was about four years old with his parents, who settled near Vanndale. He attended the private school of Judge Byers at Covington, Tenn. He was the son of the late Permelia Hargrove and David Fitzpatrick, natives of Virginia. His ancestors were of Scotch Irish descent, came to America before the French and Indian wars from Scotland and settled in Virginia. Mr. Fitzpatrick made the trip with his parents into Arkansas in an ox cart, the method of travel in the pioneer days. He spent the early days on the farm. On his return from school, he was appointed surveyor of Cross County, which position he held, also giving his attention to teaching until 1871. He then started the Wittsburg Gazette which he continued to publish until he was elected clerk of circuit court of Cross County. He continued to serve as circuit clerk until the adoption of the new constitution of 1874, when he was again a candidate on the Republican ticket, but was defeated by a small majority. He then located in St. Francis county and embarked in farming, and also erected a steam gin. In April 1872, Mr. Fitzpatrick was united in marriage to Miss Sallie E. Eldridge, and five children were born to this union. The period from 1913 to 1928 he devoted to operating his 1853 acre farm, a plateau on top of Crowley Ridge a few miles east of Colt. At the latter date, he sold this place to the Home Investment Co. which developed it into the now famous Summersweet Orchards. For the last 11 years he had made his home in Forrest City, where he devoted much of his time

to writing manuscripts and granting interviews to persons seeking information on the early history of Eastern Arkansas. He was a member of the Methodist Church at Colt. He is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Garnett Prewett of this city, and Mr. G. L. Landon of Milford, Illinois; one son, L. G. Fitzpatrick of Colt; nine grandchildren, Mrs. J. H. 
